An Old-growth Forest Assessment for the

John Earle Chase Memorial Park, a Kawartha Land Trust Property

Peterborough County, Ontario



Purpose of visit:	 Determine if sites contain old-growth forests or trees Based on property site characteristics, determine appropriate topic for a joint event with the Kawartha Land Trust 				
Weather and terrain conditions:	Overcast, 9°C. Trails still mostly covered in snow (up to 2 feet in some places) and ice. Gradual elevation changes with some ridges. Easy to access.				
Notes:	 The KLT steward's dog was with us. Can access the southeast part of the property via Fire Route 70A (the map labels this as 10A). We parked near the start of this road—see green arrow on map (figure 1). See supplementary report on the Oak Orchard ANSI (Kaiser, 1987) which overlaps with the east side of the property. 				

Site Description

- 1. This property is mostly second growth but there are a few big trees and a moderate amount of snags/coarse woody debris. White pines are scattered throughout the property.
 - a. In the southeast, poplar, white oak, red oak, and sugar maple are abundant. One hemlock and a few small elms were found along the trail.
 - b. In the southwest there is a maple/oak forest bordered by an abandoned farm field. The KLT steward notes this is probably the oldest forest on the property. Near the



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
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edge of this forest is a stand of young ironwood trees (indication that soil may have been compacted by grazing cattle). There is a blowdown area (figure 7) and evidence of high-grading (several large stumps present, figures 8 and 9).

2. Tall white oak noted south of the fire route and "celery top" white pines observed along the shore of Pigeon Lake.

A well-preserved example of upland forest remains at Oak Orchard and on a chain of islands lying to the east in Buckhorn Lake. These islands include Chief, Burnt and Nichol Islands, as well as several unnamed islands. The large forest tract extending north and east from Oak Orchard contains a variety of intermediate-aged and more mature forest stands on slightly undulating terrain. There is red oak with white pine, white oak, and large-toothed aspen (dbh 30 to 45 cm, with smaller and larger trees too); white pine (dbh 30 to 45 cm, with many trees greater than 45 cm dbh); large-toothed aspen; white birch (dbh 15 to 30 cm); and red oak, large-toothed aspen and sugar maple (dbh 15 to 30 cm). A number of stands display white pine regeneration. At the centre of the tract is a small swamp (red maple - silver maple with red ash and balsam poplar) around a small woodland pond. A narrow stretch of marsh and open water separates Oak Orchard from land to the north. The rest of the islands in the chain support a similar range of upland forest vegetation. These islands were selected and evaluated on the basis of airphoto interpretation and aerial reconnaissance in October 1985.

Most of the natural area is in excellent condition. There are several cottages along the southeast shoreline and two cottages on the other islands. Cattle can access the northwest part of the forest. While there is little sign of grazing, (cont'd)
